

#### **Open Door Policies**

#### God's Surprising Strategies for Getting Sinners Back Home

When a wayward child wanders far from home, how does a loving parent pursue them without driving them further away? One thing that parent does is let the child know that there is an ongoing open-door policy. The child knows they will always be welcomed back home. Likewise, when we wander from God, he always keeps his door open for us. But God doesn't just passively wait for us to return. He lovingly pursues sinners in ways that make them long for home. Throughout the season of Lent, we will see the surprising strategies our heavenly Father uses for getting sinners back home, close to him and the loving care he offers.

## **Lowering Our Defenses**

Whenever someone accuses us of doing wrong, it's easy to get defensive. We make excuses. "I'm not that bad." We try and balance the scales. "Okay, that was wrong. But look at all the good I do!" We play the comparison game. "At least I'm not like him!" When our defenses go up, repentance is impossible.

God, however, has a strategy for lowering our defenses. He assures us that his door is open, and that his home is the place we don't need to pretend to be something that we're not—perfect. Our Father does not ask us to come to him and confess our sin so that he might know what we've done. *He* already knows. He asks us to repent so that *we* might fully know what we've done. Only when we grasp the true weight of our sin, will we call out to God for mercy. When we do, God is always quick to forgive.




## **Instructions for the Imposition of Ashes**

The Imposition of Ashes is intended to serve as a sign of Christ-centered repentance. The use of ashes proclaims God's Holy Law in a dramatic way. Ashes are a visual reminder that the wages of sin is death (Romans 6:23), and that death means our bodies will return to the dust from which Adam was made (Genesis 3:19). The use of ashes also proclaim God's Holy Gospel. The form of the cross reminds us that because Christ gave his holy life as a sacrifice to pay for our sins, our guilt has been removed, we are made righteous in God's sight, and we are united to our living-Lord Jesus Christ through faith.

<u>Participation</u>: Taking part in this rite is voluntary; worshippers will not be required or expected to participate. Those who do not wish to receive ashes may remain seated in their pews.

<u>Instructions</u>: Those who wish to receive ashes will be ushered up to the chancel single file where Pastor will use ashes to draw a cross on their forehead (or the back of their hand) while saying, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return" (cf. Genesis 3:19). After receiving the ashes, participants will walk back to their pew using the side aisles (see the map below).

- Participants who want the ashes placed on their forehead are asked to simply step forward in front of pastor. If they have bangs, they are asked to move them out of the way of their forehead.
- Participants who want the ashes placed on the back of their hand are asked to extend that hand toward pastor.
- Parents who bring their children with them are asked to somehow make it clear if they do not want them to receive ashes. Otherwise, pastor will assume that they do and place ashes on their forehead.

#### Introduction to Confession

Brothers and sisters in Christ, God created us to know joy in fellowship with him, to love all people, and to live in harmony with all creation. But sin separates us from God, our neighbors, and creation, and so we do not enjoy the life our Creator intended for us. By our sin we grieve our Father, who does not desire us to come under his judgment, but to turn to him and live. Therefore, God in his mercy has sent our Lord Jesus Christ to take our place under the law, to suffer for us, and to die the death we deserve. God made Jesus, who had no sin, to be sin for us so that in him, we might become the righteousness of God.

During the forty days of Lent, we fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy set before him endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of God. The time of Lent reminds us that to know Christ and the power of his resurrection, we must also know the fellowship of sharing in his sufferings, becoming like him in his death. As disciples of the Lord Jesus, we are called to struggle against everything that leads us away from love of God and neighbor.

Let us confess our sins, ask our Father for forgiveness, and commit ourselves to this struggle.

Forgive us, Lord, for the wrongs we have done. For our blindness to human need and suffering and our indifference to injustice and cruelty, **Forgive us, Lord.** 

For all false judgments, for uncharitable thoughts toward others, and for our prejudice and contempt for those who differ from us, Forgive us, Lord.

For what we think or say or do that is at variance with your will, **Forgive us, Lord.** 

Restore us, good Lord, and let your anger depart from us.

Hear us, Lord, for your mercy is great.

## **Imposition of Ashes**

Those who desire to receive the sign of ashes may walk up to the chancel one at a time.

The pastor will apply ashes to the forehead or hand of each person in the form of a small cross, and say:

"Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

After all who desire to receive ashes have done so, the pastor says:

Accomplish in us, Lord, the work of your salvation that we may show forth your glory in the world.

By the cross and suffering of your Son,

bring us with all your saints to the joy of his resurrection.



#### The Word

First Reading 2 Samuel 12:1-13

The Lord sends the prophet Nathan to call King David to repentance. Nathan lowers David's defenses by telling the king a story about an immoral rich man.

12 So the LORD sent Nathan to David. He came and told him this:

There were two men in a city. One was rich and one poor. <sup>2</sup> The rich man had a large number of flocks and herds. <sup>3</sup> The poor man did not own anything except one little ewe lamb, which he had bought. He raised it so that it grew up together with him and his children. It ate from his food and drank from his cup. It slept in his arms. It was like a daughter to him. <sup>4</sup> When a traveler came to the rich man, the rich man was unwilling to take an animal from his flock or from his herd to prepare a meal for the traveler who had come to him. So he took the lamb from the poor man and prepared it for the man who had come to him.

<sup>5</sup> David's anger flared up against that man. He said to Nathan, "As the LORD lives, the man who has done this is as good as dead. <sup>6</sup> In place of that lamb, he will restore four lambs, because he did this and had no pity."

<sup>7</sup> Nathan told David, "You are the man. This is what the LORD, the God of Israel, says."

I anointed you king over Israel. I rescued you from the hand of Saul. <sup>8</sup>I gave the house of your master to you, and I gave the wives of your master into your embrace. I gave you the house of Israel and the house of Judah. If this was too little, I would have added even more. <sup>9</sup> Why have you despised the word of the LORD by doing evil in his eyes? You have struck down Uriah the Hittite with the sword. You have taken his wife as your own wife. You have killed him with the sword of the Ammonites. <sup>10</sup> So now the sword will not depart from your house forever, because you have despised me and have taken the wife of Uriah the Hittite to be your wife.

<sup>11</sup> This is what the LORD says. Look! I am raising up disaster against you from your own house. Right in front of your eyes I will take your wives and give them to your neighbor, and he will lie down with your wives in the sight of the sun. <sup>12</sup> Because you acted in secret, I will do this in front of all Israel in broad daylight.

<sup>13</sup> David said to Nathan, "I have sinned against the LORD."

Nathan said to David, "The LORD himself has put away your sin. You will not die.

The Word of the Lord.

Thanks be to God.

God sends ambassadors to make his appeal to sinners, imploring them to be reconciled to God.

<sup>20</sup> Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ, inasmuch as God is making an appeal through us. We urge you, on Christ's behalf: Be reconciled to God. <sup>21</sup> God made him, who did not know sin, to become sin for us, so that we might become the righteousness of God in him.

**6** As fellow workers we also urge you not to receive God's grace in vain. <sup>2</sup> For he says:

At a favorable time I listened to you, and in the day of salvation I helped you.

Look, now is the favorable time! See, now is the day of salvation!



<sup>9</sup> Jesus told this parable to certain people who trusted in themselves (that they were righteous) and looked down on others: <sup>10</sup> "Two men went up to the temple courts to pray. One was a Pharisee, and the other was a tax collector. <sup>11</sup> The Pharisee stood and prayed about himself like this: 'God, I thank you that I am not like other people, robbers, evildoers, adulterers, or even like this tax collector. <sup>12</sup> I fast twice a week. I give a tenth of all my income.'



## **Our Holy Communion Practices**

(Matthew 10:32-33; Romans 16:17; 1 Corinthians 10:16-17; 11:27-29; Ephesians 4:4-6; 1 John 1:3; 2 John 9-11)

#### Visitors

Before approaching the altar to receive Holy Communion, please read the following notes:

The Holy Bible teaches the celebration of the Lord's Supper is an expression of unity in faith and teaching. To be "in communion" means to share and hold in common. By receiving Holy Communion, we are not only sharing Christ's true body and blood, but we are also confessing that we publicly hold in common the same teachings of God's Holy Word.

We therefore invite to Holy Communion only those Christians who share the same teachings to which we hold, all the while recognizing the true spiritual unity and fellowship of all believers in God's Holy Christian Church (i.e. the Communion of Saints). Confirmed members of Nain and confirmed visiting members of sister congregations in the WELS (Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod) and the ELS (Evangelical Lutheran Synod) are welcome to commune with us.

If you are a member of another Lutheran synod, another Christian denomination, or of another belief, we ask that you refrain from communing with us at this time. We do this out of love and in accordance with God's words through St. Paul in 1 Corinthians 11:27-29. The pastor would be happy to speak with you if you have interest in communing in the future or have any other questions or concerns about our practices. Thank you for your patience and understanding, and for respecting our beliefs.

#### **Communicants**

"Christian Questions," a guide for personal preparation before receiving Holy Communion is printed on pages 295-296 in the hymnal. Prayers for before and after communing are printed on the first page of the hymnal.

The usher will direct you to the front of the nave, where you will commune. When the pastor distributes the bread and body of Christ, he will say, "The body of Christ, given for you." When he distributes the wine and blood of Christ, he will say, "The blood of Christ, poured out for you." Before consuming the sacramental elements, you may respond to the pastor's words by saying, "Amen" (which is Hebrew for, "Truly," or "Yes, it is so") as a way to confess your belief that the body and blood of Jesus are truly present in the Lord's Supper for the forgiveness of your sins.

#### Children and Non-Communicants

Children and other non-communicants are welcome to approach the altar to receive a blessing from the pastor. He will make the sign of the cross on the head of each and say, "The Lord bless you." Non-Communicant adults are asked to cross their arms over their chest to indicate that they do not intend to commune.


