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Lent **Return to the LORD!**

The word Lent comes from an Old English word for spring ("lengthen," the time of the year when the days grow longer). For over 1400 years, the Church has set aside the 40 days between Ash Wednesday and Easter as a journey of repentance and prayer, of remembrance and renewal of our baptism. God's merciful call to his people serves as one of the themes of this penitential season - "Return to the LORD your God" (Joel 2:13).

Midweek of Lent 3

Trial before the High Priest

This evening we continue to hear from the Passion History of our Lord according to the Gospel of St. Luke. After being captured in Gethsemane, Jesus was led to the house of the high priest and eventually to the members of the Sanhedrin. The conflict between Jesus and the enemies of God escalated as our Savior was tried unfairly, mocked, beaten, and rejected in unbelief.

In the hour of Jesus' trial, Peter was also tested to give a confession of faith. In fear, he failed. Jesus' look and the words he had spoke earlier brought Peter to tears of sorrow.

We too are tested by God to trust in him no matter what the circumstances and to boldly confess our faith in him as Lord and Savior. Like Peter, we often fail to follow God's will. Therefore, we too must sorrow over our sins. However, our Lord Jesus looks at us in love and calls us to repentance. After moving our hearts to confess our sin, God restores us by his grace, and lifts us up from the pit of despair with his ever-forgiving love.







Service of the Word

Reading Isaiah 50:4-10

Isaiah records the words of the LORD's Servant - the coming Messiah. Though the Servant listens to the Word of the LORD and obeys it perfectly, he suffers at the hands of evildoers. However, it is through his patient suffering that he brings salvation to those who worship him in faith. God did not abandon his Servant. He helped him by delivering him from all sorrow and pain and raising him from the grave. God kept his promise to his Son. He will not fail to keep his Son's promise to us!

- The LORD God gave me a tongue like the learned, an instructed tongue, so I know how to sustain the weary with a word.
 He wakes me up morning by morning.
 He wakes up my ears so that I listen like the learned.
- 5 The LORD God opened my ear, and I myself was not rebellious. I did not turn back.
- I submitted my back to those who beat me,
 and my cheeks to those who pulled out my beard.
 I did not hide my face from disgrace and from spit.
- The LORD God will help me,
 so I will not be disgraced.
 Therefore I have made my face hard like flint.
 I know that I will not be put to shame.
- The one who will acquit me is near!
 Who can accuse me?
 Let us take our stand.
 Who can pass judgment on me?
 Let him approach me.
- Look, the LORD God will help me.
 Who then can declare me guilty?
 Look, all of them will wear out like a garment.
 A moth will consume them.
- Who among you worships the LORD and listens to the voice of his servant? Anyone who walks in darkness and who has no bright light—

let him trust in the name of the LORD, and let him lean on his God.

Psalm 102:1-22

Psalm 102 is the fifth of the seven penitential psalms. The Church sings Psalm 102 to ask for the Lord's consideration in times of weariness and poor health. Martin Luther said, "Psalm 102 is a psalm of prayer. (God's people) yearn and call out for the kingdom of grace promised in Christ because they are weary of laws, sins, and death. Without Christ there is indeed only brokenness in the midst of earthly life, but in his kingdom there is eternal life, and there is no dying there. May that kingdom come!"

- O LORD, hear my prayer, and let my cry for help come to you.
- Do not hide your face from me
 on the day when I am distressed.
 Turn your ear to me on the day I call.
 Hurry! Answer me!
- ³ For my days go up in smoke, and my bones are burned like hot coals.
- ⁴ My heart is cut down and withered like grass, so I forget to eat my food.
- Because of the sound of my groaning, my bones stick out of my flesh.
- 6 I am like an owl in the wilderness, like a screech owl among the ruins.
- I lie awake. I have become like a lonely bird on a roof.
- 8 All day long my enemies taunt me. Those who ridicule me use my name as a curse,
- 9 because I eat ashes like bread, and I mix tears with my drinks.

- Because of your rage and your wrath, you have picked me up and thrown me away.
- ¹¹ My days are being stretched out like a shadow, and I am dried up like grass.
- ¹² But you, LORD, sit on your throne forever, and you will be remembered through all generations.
- ¹³ You will rise and have compassion on Zion. Yes, it is time to be gracious to her, because the appointed time has come.
- ¹⁴ Yes, your servants will show favor to her stones, and they will have compassion on her dust.
- 15 Then the nations will fear the name of the LORD, and all the kings of the earth will fear your glory.
- ¹⁶ For the Lord will rebuild Zion. He will appear in his glory.
- ¹⁷ He will respond to the prayer of the naked. He will not despise their prayer.
- ¹⁸ Let this be written till the last generation, so that a people not yet created may praise the Lord.
- ¹⁹ For the Lord looked down from his high, holy place. From heaven he viewed the earth
- to hear the groans of the prisoner,
- to release those condemned to death.
- ²¹ So the name of the Lord will be recorded in Zion. and his praise in Jerusalem,
- ²² when the peoples and the kingdoms are gathered together to serve the Lord.

Passion History Luke 22:54-71

Under the custody of armed soldiers, Jesus was taken to the house of the high priest and then to the members of the Sanhedrin. He was unfairly mocked, beaten, rejected as the Christ, and accused of blasphemy. Nevertheless, he continued to testify to the truth and went uncomplaining forth to the cross where he would willingly sacrifice his life on behalf of others. Peter had the opportunity to testify to the truth like Jesus did. However, in the interest of self-preservation, he denied his Lord three times.

⁵⁴ Then they seized (Jesus), led him away, and brought him into the high priest's house.

Peter followed at a distance. ⁵⁵ When they had lit a fire in the middle of the courtyard and sat down together, Peter sat down among them. ⁵⁶ A servant girl saw him sitting near the light. She looked closely at him and said, "This man also was with him."

- 57 But he denied it, saying, "Woman, I do not know him."
- ⁵⁸ After a little while someone else saw him and said, "You also are one of them!"

But Peter answered, "Man, I am not!"

⁵⁹ After about one hour had passed, someone else was firmly insisting, "Truly this man was with him too, because he is a Galilean!"

⁶⁰ But Peter said, "Man, I don't know what you are talking about!" At that very moment, while he was still speaking, the rooster crowed. ⁶¹ The Lord turned and looked at Peter. Then Peter remembered the Lord's word, how he had said to him, "Before the rooster crows today you will deny me three times." ⁶² He went outside and wept bitterly.

⁶³ The men who were holding Jesus in custody mocked him while they were beating him. ⁶⁴ They blindfolded him and kept asking him, "Prophesy! Who hit you?" ⁶⁵ And they went on saying many other blasphemous things against him.

⁶⁶ As soon as it was day, the council of the elders of the people met together, both the chief priests and experts in the law. They brought him into their Sanhedrin and said, ⁶⁷ "If you are the Christ, tell us."

But he said to them, "If I tell you, you will not believe, ⁶⁸ and if I ask you, you will not answer me or release me. ⁶⁹ But from now on, the Son of Man will be seated at the right hand of the power of God."

⁷⁰ They all said, "Are you then the Son of God?"

He said to them, "I am what you are saying."

⁷¹Then they said, "Why do we need any more testimony? For we ourselves have heard it from his own mouth!"


Thus far the Passion History of Our Lord.




